

Membership in the Gamaliel Foundation


The CCHD absolutely forbids organizations from membership in organizations acting against Catholic teaching. In an <u>FAQ on the USCCB website</u>, the CCHD directly answers the question about whether grantees may be members of coalitions that oppose Catholic teachings. In answer, the CCHD firmly stated, "CCHD will not fund groups that are knowingly members of coalitions that have as part of their organizational purpose or coalition agenda, positions or actions that contradict fundamental Catholic moral and social teaching."

What about participation in coalitions for a good purpose, like better wages or housing, that include groups acting against Catholic values on other issues?

CCHD encourages groups to work across geographical, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological lines to overcome poverty and advance the common good. However, CCHD will not fund groups that are knowingly members of coalitions that have as part of their organizational purpose or coalition agenda, positions or actions that contradict fundamental Catholic moral and social teaching (e.g. promotion or support of abortion, same-sex marriage, euthanasia, racism, as well as the use of the death penalty punitive measures toward immigrants, etc.). Prohibited activities include participation in or endorsing actions that promote legislation, and ballot initiatives (including voter guides and other written materials) that contradict Catholic moral or social teaching.

Given this, there is no way CCHD should have provided a grant to the MCU due to its membership in the Gamaliel Foundation.

The Gamaliel Network identifies Genesis as one of its affiliate members.

The CCHD has had run-ins with the Gamaliel Foundation before, most notably when Gamaliel lied to the CCHD about its membership with another organization called the Fair Immigration Reform Movement (FIRM).

This screen capture showing Gamaliel's membership in FIRM came from a document that was originally found on the Gamaliel website. Since the discovery of this document, Gamaliel has password protected the page so nobody can see the evidence.

<u>Today</u>, the <u>Fair Immigration Reform Movement</u>, a coalition of grassroots organizations, <u>released the following statement calling for LGBT inclusion in comprehensive immigration reform:</u>




In July of 2012, American Life League sent this and other documentation to the CCHD, showing that the Gamaliel Foundation is a member of the same-sex 'marriage' endorsing FIRM, in violation of CCHD grant guidelines. On August 8, ALL received a letter from one CCHD rep. who said that the CCHD discussed this with the Gamaliel Foundation, and Gamaliel informed the CCHD that they severed all ties with FIRM in 2010, specifically BECAUSE of the its position on homosexuality. In fact, Gamaliel went so far as to provide the CCHD with a copy of a letter it claims it sent to FIRM in 2010, explaining that it no longer wishes to be a member, along with the reasons why.

However, further investigation quickly proved Gamaliel's claims to be false, showing that Gamaliel lied to the CCHD. The following information was extracted from Gamaliel's OWN website. Bear in mind that Gamaliel told CCHD that they severed ties with FIRM in 2010, so there should be no further information connecting the two organizations beyond 2010.

This list of files under the heading "FIRM Strategy Session," all dated for the year 2011, were found on Gamaliel's website at this link (which is no longer accessible to the public): //news.gamaliel.org/documents/CRI/cri.html



Each of these items listed was a link to a file. The first file on the list, labeled "FIRM Contact Life – Membership 2011" states that the list is effective December 2011, nearly two years after FIRM officially declared its support for the legal recognition of same-sex relationships. This file clearly shows Gamaliel's Executive Director, Ana Garcia Ashley and Gamaliel's Director of Civil Rights and Immigrants, Juan Soto, as member contacts for 2011.



This file, titled, "List of current FIRM member organizations plus brief descriptions 2011," contains an entry for the Gamaliel Foundation (which is not supposed to be a member at this time, remember), indicating that Gamaliel is a founding member of FIRM and currently sits in EC, which means Executive Committee.


List of current FIRM member organizations plus brief descriptions (2011)



Gamaliel Foundation:

Under the leadership of Ana Garcia-Ashley, the Gamaliel Foundation seeks to assist local community leaders to create, maintain and expand independent, grassroots, and powerful faith-based community organizations. <u>Gamaliel Foundation is a founding member of FIRM and currently sits in EC.</u>

This is a screen capture of a google group entry for FIRM. This entry gives a set of meeting minutes from a monthly conference call that took place on December 9, 2011. Note that Ana Garcia-Ashley of the Gamaliel Foundation is listed as a participant on the call.



On the same page is a statement that 18 organizations were nominated for membership on the executive committee for 2012, and one of those organizations is the Gamaliel Foundation.



Simply put, there is no way around the fact that Gamaliel lied to the CCHD about its relationship with FIRM. The supposed 2010 letter Gamaliel claims to have sent to FIRM "severing all ties" is a complete fabrication. Gamaliel could not have severed all ties with FIRM while its own files on its own website indicate continued membership throughout the year 2011, and a group communication shows that Gamaliel was nominated for the executive committee for 2012. The Gamaliel Foundation lied to the CCHD.

But even today, Gamaliel is involved in activities forbidden by the CCHD. Currently, Gamaliel is a <u>dues-paying member of the National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy</u> (NCRP), who strongly supports pro-abortion policies and reforms, as seen in their "<u>factsheet</u>" published in January of 2021:



For the past 48 years, Roe v. Wade has been perceived as the fortress that keeps abortion safe, legal and accessible. But people on the frontlines have cautioned the movement not to put their faith in that perception.

The past 12 months have shown just how dangerous and fragile that reliance on Roe is. Many expected the turmoil of an election year to result in new reproductive restrictions, but most were not prepared for those attacking abortion access to weaponize COVID-19 as a tactic.

There is no need to imagine a world without Roe v. Wade. It has become the de facto reality across the country.

Between 2015 and 2019, there was nearly \$1.7 billion in foundation funding for reproductive rights issues, but only 21% was explicitly designated for abortion rights and services, while less than 2% was specifically designated for abortion funds.¹

The sector was clearly committed to abortion advocacy at both state and national levels, but there are little data showing foundation funding for the essential work held by abortion funds.

In early 2020, NCRP began exploring philanthropy's investment in reproductive justice. Abortion is not the

WHAT ARE ABORTION FUNDS AND WHAT DO THEY DO?

An abortion fund is a group of people who will help pay for your abortion when you cannot afford it. Some funds can help you with practical support (i.e. travel, lodging, child care) and doula and translation services so that accessing an abortion is less challenging. Abortion funds also work to change laws and cultures that make abortions hard to get.



In March of 2021, NCRP leadership made it clear that access to abortion was a primary focus area of its work in an article titled, "<u>It's Time for Philanthropy to Think Differently about Reproductive Access</u>." In the article, NCRP equated abortion with "economic justice, racial justice, immigrant rights and health equity," saying:

"Reproductive rights – and the availability of safe, legal and accessible abortions — are inexorably intertwined with economic justice, racial justice, immigrant rights and health equity. So is the expectation of safety – mental and physical.

Who gets to make which choices — or gets a choice at all — is a structural issue.

NCRP's new focus on reproductive access and gendered violence in our Movement Investment Project continues our efforts in increasing philanthropic support for frontline groups combatting the structures that stand in the way of social justice."

Most recently, <u>NCRP called for the funding of abortion clinics</u> in the wake of the overturning of Roe v. Wade, saying:

"The Supreme Court's controversial, but predictable decision to disregard precedent and overturn the landmark 1973 Roe vs. Wade case is a disastrous validation of the danger of ignoring frontline voices."

ROE DECISION A WAKE-UP CALL FOR PHILANTHROPY

Bold, vocal support and funding for frontline abortion providers and funds, & a diversity of tactics critical to ensuring millions don't lose basic healthcare and civil rights.

Washington, DC – For years, abortion providers and activists have been sounding the alarm that a strategy focused exclusively on national level advocacy, legislation and the courts was failing to secure access for pregnant people on the ground and insufficient to winning the long-term struggle for reproductive justice. The Supreme Court's controversial, but predictable decision to disregard precedent and overturn the landmark 1973 Roe vs. Wade case is a disastrous validation of the danger of ignoring frontline voices.

"This is a moment for funders to be bold and brave. No more hiding behind anonymous gifts, no more refusal to support abortion clinics and funds on the ground," said Brandi Collins Calhoun, Movements Manager for the National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy (NCRP). "The movement needs practical support at all levels, in all states. Less than 2% of philanthropic funding for rep roductive rights has gone to abortion funds. That needs to change immediately. Abortion funds and clinics are the first responders for pregnant people seeking care and they will need more resources than ever to respond in this increasingly hostile environment."

Conclusion

Genesis is directly advocating for homosexual and transgender ideologies. Furthermore, Genesis is a member of the Gamaliel Foundation with not only lied directly to the CCHD regarding one of its memberships, but is currently a dues-paying member of the pro-abortion National Committee for Responsive Philanthropy.
